
Talk about win win ...You get to enjoy delicious jam and at the same time help the WI or the Church.

Parsnip & Apple Soup

Easy to make, freezes well and tastes delicious

- 25g/1oz butter (I used Flora Plant butter)
- -1 tbsp sunflower oil
- 2 medium onions chopped
- 600g/1lb 5oz parsnips cut into 2cm/1" pieces
- 2 garlic cloves crushed
- 600g/ 1lb 5oz Bramley Apples, peeled, quartered, cut into chunks
- 1 litre / 1.75 pints vegetable stock
- 150ml/ 5 fl oz milk (I used almond milk)
- Flaked sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Melt the butter and oil in a large saucepan. Gently fry the onions and parsnips for 15mins or until softened. Add the garlic and apples and cook for a further 2 mins stirring regularly.


Pour over the stock and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat to a simmer and cook for about 20mins or until parsnips are very soft. Remove from heat and season with salt and pepper. Blend if you wish until smooth.

Stir in the milk. Season to taste and serve. I sometimes add chopped nuts and chopped herbs or spinach as a garnish.
