The Group then sangJerusalem accompanied by one member playing the Piano.


Apologies - There were 9 apologies.

Fay told us what it was like being a Tiller girl and what it meant to her life.

She traveled around UK and the world, featuring in all the well know shows of the time including Sunday night at the Palladium on television. A weekly programme, the girls would have one day to rehearse before the programme would go out live.

These days the summer season at Blackpool last two weeks, however on those days it would last five months. The schedules were gruelling and she was away from home, but she was part of one large family with her fellow dancers, whom she regarded as sisters.

It was a really interesting talk and refreshments followed-delicious as always!
